

## Protection of water bodies

<b>Goal</b>	Protecting water quality from agricultural runoffs.
<b>Short description of the measure</b>	<p>Many of the pressures affecting water ecosystems are directly related to agricultural management. Pollutants can enter surface water bodies through different routes. Most important are the losses from point sources (originating from the farmyard) and diffuse sources (originating from treated fields, e.g. surface runoff/soil erosion, drainage and spray drift)</p> <p><b>Diffuse pollution</b> can suppose between 40-90% of total pollution (pollution coming from many small and widespread sources such as fertiliser run-off from agricultural land). These pollutants include sediment, nutrients, pathogens, pesticides, metals, and salts. Impacts from agricultural activities on surface water and ground water can be minimized by using management practices that are adapted to local conditions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Management practices that control the volume and flow rate of runoff water, keep the soil in place, and reduce soil transport. Measures that avoid bare soil such as green covers.</li> <li>To combat nutrient losses, farmers can implement nutrient management plans that help maintain high yields and save money on fertilizers. Riparian strips (See AFS 24).</li> <li>Farmers and ranchers can limit discharges by storing and managing facility wastewater and runoff with appropriate waste management systems.</li> </ul> <p>To reduce contamination from pesticides, farmers should use Integrated Pest Management (IPM) techniques based on the specific soils, climate, pest history, and crop conditions for a particular field.</p>
<b>Timeframe</b> (When to start a measure and anticipated time for implementation)	All over the calendar.
<b>How auditors can assess if the measure has been implemented in a good quality?</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Avoid bare soil.</li> <li>Integrated Pest Management applied.</li> <li>Nutrient management plans implemented.</li> <li>Riparian strips along water bodies (See AFS on riparian strips).</li> </ul>
<b>Additional information the auditor need for verification (if any)</b>	In Spain, Zones free of nitrates have been designed in every region. Particular legislation applied at these regions to comply Nitrates Directive and Water Framework Directive.

<b>Effects on bio-diversity</b> (ecosystems, species, soil bio-diversity)	 <p>Too much sediment can cloud the water, reducing the amount of sunlight that reaches aquatic plants. It can also clog the gills of fish or smother fish larvae.</p>
	 <p>Pollutants like fertilizers, pesticides, and heavy metals are often attached to the soil particles of sediments and wash into the water bodies, causing algal blooms and depleted oxygen, which is deadly to most aquatic life.</p> <p>Pesticides can poison fish and wildlife, contaminate food sources, and destroy the habitat that animals use for protective cover</p>
	 <p>Runoff from poorly managed livestock facilities can carry pathogens such as bacteria and viruses, nutrients, and oxygen-demanding organics and solids that contaminate shell-fishing areas and cause other water quality problems. Ground water can also be contaminated by waste seepage.</p>
	 <p>Overgrazing exposes soils, increases erosion, encourages invasion by undesirable plants, destroys fish habitat, and may destroy streambanks and floodplain vegetation necessary for habitat and water quality filtration.</p>
